## A Hero is Finally Coming Home: The Final Chapter of the Roy Harms Story

On August 1, 1943 the Army Air Corps launched a huge effort to deprive the German war machine of it's oil. One hundred and eighty -one B-24 bombers took off from Benghazi, Libya and flew to Ploesti, Romania to bomb five oil refineries.

Piloting one of those aircraft was First Lt. Roy Harms of Grafton. He flew with the 329th Squadron or the 93rd Bomb Group. Harms and all but one of his nine man crew were killed as

their bomber made it's run into a refinery. More than three hundred US airmen perished in this attack. Five Medals of Honor were awarded that day. Harms posthumously received the Distinguished Flying Cross, the second highest military award.

Because of the chaos and carnage of the battle, the remains of many of the airmen were not identified. The local Romanians buried them and at the end of the war, the unidentified remains were reburied at the Ardennes American Cemetery near Liege, Belgium. Harms, along with many others who were not identified are memorialized on the Wall of the Missing at the Florence American Cemetery in Italy.

About ten years ago, the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA) began an effort to identify these remains. Harms's sister, Laura, was asked for a DNA sample. She passed away in 2020 at the age of 99. In August, the remaining Harms family members were notified that the DPAA had positively identified the remains of Lt. Harms. The news came exactly 79 years from the date he gave his life for his country.

The DPAA is scheduled to meet with the Harms family in October to outline details of his remains and their contribution to a ceremony. It is the wish of the Harms family that Roy's remains come home to Grafton. The Ozaukee County Historical Society will play a major role in this homecoming memorial when the details are finalized. ## **Membership Changes 2023**

The last time the OCHS membership rates were reviewed and increased was over a decade ago in 2009. The Board of Directors recently reviewed the current membership structure as compared with other local historical societies and similar organizations. As with everything, operating costs, wages and maintenance costs have increased. The Board has decided that the membership structure should be simplified and adjusted as of January 1, 2023.

The Board believes your OCHS membership is still a tremendous bargain and provides many benefits. Below is a comparison to outline the changes:

The membership year begins January 1<sup>st</sup> and ends December 31<sup>st</sup>. If renewal is paid on or after September 1<sup>st</sup>, the membership will be for the remaining months of the current year <u>and</u> the entire next year.

New <u>Standard Membership</u> benefits include free admission to Pioneer Village on open weekends during the summer and free admission to scheduled events, with the exception of Bluegrass at the Village and the Harry Potter Festival. The cost for OCHS members to attend Bluegrass at the Village and Harry Potter will be \$5.00 per person. Members will also receive 10% off all Pioneer Village Gift Shop items and Archives merchandise.

New <u>Sustaining Membership</u> benefits include free admission to Pioneer Village for all open weekends and event weekends, including Bluegrass at the Village and the Harry Potter Festival. Sustaining Members will also receive 10% off all Pioneer Village Gift Shop items and Archives merchandise. Sustaining Membership will also include a complimentary guided tour of either Pioneer Village or Stony Hill School (must be scheduled in advance). Plus, Sustaining Membership includes up to one (1) free hour of Genealogy/Research at the Archives with one of the archivists (must be scheduled in advance).

All existing Lifetime members (Individual or Family) will retain their current status and Sustaining Member- level benefits.
