ED RAPPOLD PRESENTS AT NEXT QUARTERLY MEETING

W ell-known Cedarburg resident Ed Rappold will give a slide presen-

tation titled: "Cedarburg and the Surrounding Area" at the next quarterly meeting of the Ozaukee County Historical Society on Monday, February 5, 2007 at the Cedarburg Cultural Center.

Ed, a professional photographer by trade, has been collecting photos of Cedarburg and the surrounding cities and villages as a hobby for over 60 years. He recently donated a collection of over 2,200 photos (40 albums) to the Cedarburg Cultural Center. Ed has also been giving slide

presentations about the Cedarburg area for nearly 60 years, and his unique sense

STONY HILL SCHOOL DAMAGED

The area of Stony Hill School has been the scene of a number of vehicle accidents lately.

An accident at the intersection of Cty. Hwy. I and Fredonia-Koehler Road caused a vehicle to detour through the north end of the grounds causing property damage as shown in the photo.

Within a brief timeframe, according to Ozaukee County Sheriff's Department records, there was another accident involving three vehicles just to the north of Stony Hill School where injuries and

fatalities were involved. This accident was covered by the newspapers and television news reporting.

If that wasn't enough, a hit and run incident took place when a vehicle left the roadway on Cty. Hwy. I and went straight through the Stony Hill Sign as well as the decorative rock garden and plantings located on the southeast portion of the grounds. They say that things often come in "threes", or is it

"three strikes and you're out"?

Fortunately, there was no damage to the Stony Hill Schoolhouse. The property damage on the north end of the grounds consisting of: split

rail fence posts being snapped off and a number of rails damaged, vertical posts/horizontal parking area beams being shifted and some snapped off. Stone border areas and grounds damage is covered by insurance. The various areas have been cleaned up and will be restored to their original status as weather permits.

Work has already commenced to rebuild and restructure the sign with materials being placed on order. These areas will also be worked on as weather permits with no insurance proceeds since it was a separate incident and considered to be a hit and run.

Follow up will continue with the Ozaukee County Sheriff's Department should any news come in from affiliated law enforcement offices and body shops regarding the hit and run incident.

When traveling in the area of Stony Hill School please keep safety in mind as recent accidents indicate an increased need for it! PAGE 2 TIMELINES

KEEPING ON TRACK!

New Year will bring additional progress with the remaining elements of the Interurban Depot Restoration Project. Since our last TimeLines publication some additional elements have been completed including the acclimatization and organization of the Ozaukee County Archives Research Center to its "new" surroundings.

The New Year of 2007 also brings with it the "Centennial Celebration" of the Electric Interurban Railway in Ozaukee County that served our area from 1907 to 1948. Watch for additional details and specifics coming up!

We are pleased to report to members and friends that plans for the extension of the Interurban Trail have been approved by the Cedarburg Parks & Recreation Board and were placed on the agenda of the Cedarburg Common Council for discussion and action on January 15th. After discussion and review of all particulars, the plans were unanimously approved! This project will extend the trail on the westernmost edge of the O.C.H.S. property running north from Center Street to the U.S. Postal Service property turning easterly between the former Cedarburg Police Department Building and the lot line of the Cedarburg Post Office. This will offer a variety of benefits to include trail user safety and will restore the Ozaukee Interurban Trail to the original Electric Interurban Right of Way. It will also provide a more direct route for trail users allowing for more visibility of the restored Interurban Depot and more exposure of our facility and the O.C.H.S. This will be Phase I of the site plan development with Phase II being implemented if and when the Cedarburg Public Library Expansion Project moves forward on site. At that time we will work together to develop the remaining areas. Phase I site plans

are to have the work done in early Spring of 2007 prior to a gala opening and centennial celebration event.

While much has been completed, there are some elements of the project that are still in the process of being done or are planned to be done. Additional interior and exterior work continues as we move forward, and we thank those who volunteer their time and talents in a variety of ways. Thanks also go to those who continue to make tax deductible contributions to the restoration project. We continue to seek anyone who has or knows of anyone who has memorabilia or artifacts from the Electric Interurban Railway era dating from the early 1900's until the last run in 1948. Artifacts, memorabilia, schedules, tokens and all items relating to the "Interurban Era" may be provided on loan or donated for display in the museum area that will assist in telling the story of the interurban. Now is the time to "get on board" as we plan and finalize our displays!

You can share a part of history and preserve a part of Ozaukee County's vital past by sharing your artifacts. Those who provide any materials for the display areas will be acknowledged.

GENEAOLOGY NEWS: NEW ONLINE BIRTH INDEX AVAILABLE


The Wisconsin Historical Society recently added Pre-1907 Wisconsin Vital Records Index to its website. The index can be found at:


www.wisconsinhistory.org/vitalrecords

This index includes a digitized version of a 1970s microfiche index which in-

cludes thousands of delayed births, or births that were filed many years after the event (These had previously been indexed separately), as well as Wisconsin death records. The result is a free public access to more than a million Wisconsin births and nearly 400,000 deaths, dating from the 1840s through 1907.

Researchers can search the index in a variety of ways, such as using just a last name or browsing by county and year if trying various names and locations. A copy of the records can be ordered online for a \$15.00 fee, plus shipping.





News From the Archives...

The phone rings. "Can you help me? I'm looking for my husband's great grandfather. He used to be in your area, but we don't know where he is buried." As I ask questions, I learn he changed his name to one that was easier to spell. We also learn that while they might have lived here part of their lives, they moved on and so the tracking is more difficult. This is just a sample of the work here at the archives.

Recently, visitors working on their family history concluded their day by telling us they had been to numerous other societies in the vicinity and had nothing but praise for our collection of resource material. They said "you have so much!". Occasionally we receive thank you notes for the help we've provided. We appreciate the recognition and are so happy to be of service.

We even get visitors off the street. They see that we are open and they come in to find out what we are about. Often, we find that not everyone knows what an "Interurban Depot" is, or even an Interurban! We live in a different world, and that is why it is so very important to preserve history as we are able.

Another aspect of our preservation is in accepting donations that seem to be "newer". With out these donations, this part of our past may fall by the wayside as we move into more modern things. I can't express it often enough.

For example, new people buy a house and move into the area. If it is 50 years old, they think it is old! So now they want some history on the house. One man that came in recently found some interesting papers and posters behind the walls of his house. This lead him to explore a bit more.



Get people to tell their stories, or write them down for them. A school child's interview of Grandpa is fine, but so is an interview by an adult! Time for reminiscing is valuable. Family get-togethers over the dinner table used to be a great time for this, but that too has changed as everyone has to be somewhere else.

arly in October, Mary Sayner, Ruth Renz, Jane Butz and I took a road trip to Sheboygan Falls to tour the Sheboygan County Historical Research Center. From SCHRC Director Beth Dippel, we learned that SCHRC is an independent, non-profit organization established in 1980. Although it works closely with the Sheboygan County Historical Society it is not formally a part of the Society.

The Research Center is an archival library dedicated to preserving written history of the county. We were impressed to see that it is located in the Cole Historic District and is housed in the beautiful "Mill House" which was built in

1837. In 1985, the building's owners partnered with historic preservationists to restore and rehabilitate the home. It is the oldest building still standing in Sheboygan County.

Like our own Archives Research Center, the SCHRC has valuable information and records on subjects such as cemeteries, marriages, obituaries and plat maps. In addition, our tour guide, Don, showed us the Center's impressive collection of books written by local authors as well as their photograph files.

As a souvenir of our visit we each received a copy of the October issue of

their newsletter, "The Researcher" which was being assembled during our tour.

The center is located at 518 Water Street in Sheboygan Falls and is open Tuesday through Saturday from 9:00 am until 4:00 pm. You can find more details about SCHRC at www.schrc.org.

By-the-way, if you visit Sheboygan Falls, be sure to check out the many downtown shops and restaurants. We found a delightful restaurant in a historic building with a delicious choice of menu items.

Cedarburg News - Jan. 3, 1907 (Locals)

"Do not spit on the floor. To do so may spread disease". This is the wording of a sing sent out by the post-office department at Washington. The signs have been sent in compliance with a recent order issued for the purpose of keeping offices of the country in as sanitary a condition as possible. Clerks who may have tuberculosis or other infectious diseases are warned not to spit on the floor, it being felt that the disease may spread among those who are not infected. RJR

At the coming elections women may vote on candidates for one officer. Women over 21 years of age who have lived over one year in the state and ten days in the election district may vote for county superintendent of school, who is to be elected on Tuesday, April 2. RJR
