PORT WASHINGTON STATE BANK— FIVE GENERATIONS OF SERVING OZAUKEE COUNTY

The late 1800's found Port Washington and most of Ozaukee County without proper banking services and with many previously failed ventures. Two partners, Clarence Hill and Dr. George Henry, both of Manitowoc, got together to purchase a site and organize what was to become Port Washington State Bank, on September 11, 1899. Hill, one of the organizers of the First National Bank of Manitowoc in 1895, and Henry, a local dentist with Port Washington ties, capitalized the bank with \$25,000 in personal and investor monies.

Their venture, however, was not without problems. What became known as the Great Wisconsin Chair Factory Fire, leveled most of the business district--just two days after their land purchase! With determination and the support of the city and its residents, the bank pushed forward, survived World Wars, the Great Depression, dozens of up-and-down economic cycles and now has six, full service locations throughout Ozaukee County.

Today, 116 years later, Port Washington State Bank is still principally owned and actively managed by the third, fourth and fifth generation descendants of Clarence Hill, and also retains its independence and strong community ties. Join us to hear the stories and details of how this bank survived, grew and helped write the history of our county.

Rick Thiel shared this interesting photo of a PLOWING BEE held at the Thill Farm, Fredonia -- as an act of community helping spirit! The photo was published in The Sheboygan Press on November 10, 1950. All of the farmers in the photo are named in the photo caption (but apparently not in order). Rick would appreciate help from

anyone who may be able to help him identify exactly "who is who"in the photo. The caption reads:

Michael Thill, who operates a farm on-half mile east of Fredonia, was kicked by a horse several weeks ago and ended up in bed with a fractured leg. He hadn't started his fall plowing at the time, and he was a little concerned as to when he would get it done. Last Saturday afternoon the neighbors shown above held a plowing bee on the Thill farm and turned over the 40 acres in two and one-half hours. Those helping in the project were Clarence Ansay, Nicholas Depies, John Pierre, Math Kirst, Dom Heinen, Arnold Karrels, Leo Paulus, William Kultgen, Robert Thill, William Haskey, Joseph Lenz and John P Kertz. Mrs. Thill served a chicken dinner to the neighbors when the work was done.
