points beyond. You'll laugh along with her humorous anecdotes about living in the White House...then share in her tears as she relates how the horrors of war impacted their lives. After the assassination of her husband, our country's 16th president, Mary Todd Lincoln was an unsettled spirit. She had lost three of her four sons and suffered estrangement from her eldest son, Robert. She was also hounded by creditors, plagued by declining health and was weighed down by her overwhelming grief. You'll run the gamut of emotions as Jessica Michna takes you on this memorable journey as you see Mary Todd's incredible life unfold before you. Dressed in the fashions of the time with period music to set the scene... you won't want the evening to end.

Originally from Pennsylvania and now living in Racine, Jessica developed a love of American history at an early age, visiting the many Revolutionary and Civil War sites in her area. She appeared in various theatrical productions and designed and constructed costumes during her high school years, and was offered a scholarship to the Goodman School of Theater in Chicago. Her theatrical aspirations were put on hold while she raised a family and earned a degree in psychology from the University of Wisconsin. After working several years in the healthcare field, she eventually returned to her two great loves--history and the theater. The result was the birth of "First Impressions"--which consisted of almost two years of research, script writing, costume construction and endless rehearsals--culminating in the first public performance of Mary Todd Lincoln. Audiences loved her. In 2005, Eleanor Roosevelt made her debut; followed by Abigail Adams, in 2008; and Sari (Ma) Semple, Jessica's first fictitious character, in 2009.

This program is sponsored by the Ozaukee County Historical Society and will be held, Monday, August 1, at The Providence Place, in Grafton. The OCHS business meeting will begin at 7:00 p.m., with the presentation starting at 7:30. The event is free and open to the public with refreshments served. The Providence Place is located in Grafton at 815 Washington St., also known as Highway 60. If you're coming from I-43 into Grafton on Highway 60, cross the railroad tracks and The Providence Place is the first driveway on the left. See photo on page 2.

The History of Ozaukee County Historical Society - Chapter 13

Fifty years later, we have grown to be a credit to our society.....

Early in 2004 it became evident that we needed a volunteer coordinator. This has beome a demanding job. To date, we have had several fill this job. Board members a vital part of our organization. We are grateful for the time they dedicate to our Society. This too is demanding and each board director has a responsibility to some aspect of the Society. Brochures need to be changed and updated and printed and then sent out to many locations for promotion. We received a pot belly stove for the Liberty School and a mat for under it. Due to some extremely hot days, we realized we also needed a "cool down" room for people needing aid. As a result an air conditioner was installed in the school for just that purpose.

From time to time work has to be done at Stony Hill School. This includes repair work, replacement of rotting wood, flag pole painting, replacing new flags, as well as grounds upkeep. It was July of 2005 that the Antique Tractor Show was moved to the Village. Also it was the year we had an Arts and Craft Show with 42 exhibitors. Each fall, Mequon-Thiensville has a "History Day" event and we have had a booth there which has proved popular. On Saturday during our Rev. War re enactment a wedding of two of the re enactors took place. It was an 18th Century Wedding. We also loaned photos for a display that the Luxembourg Society had at Ellis Island. We continue to put on displays at area libraries when asked.

It was February 21, 2006, that we held our first Board meeting in the new archive location at the Interurban Depot. It wasn't until April that we began in earnest to move into our new building. Many helping hands, many back breaking loads of boxes later we had our things out of the Lincoln Building. Now the work really began. We recognized that there was a need to get organized... so trying to get some order was a major job. Where is everything that we need to help people coming in for research? The Gala Open House was held on Sept, 28, 29, 30th. Special guests attended the first night and the Dedication was on the 30th.

June 2nd and 3rd of 2006 we were part of the Cultural Center Stone and Century House Tour. This proved to be quite a showcase for the community to see what we have and what our work is all about. We also partook in Cedarburg's annual Business Fair by having a booth there. We host many tour groups and Scout group meetings at our new location. By 2007we had a new event at the Village, Bluegrass @ the Village. It continues annually. The caretakers home needed some upgrading, such as a new gas furnace, an air conditioning unit, upgrades to windows and new gutters and downspouts.

Our membership fluctuates, but it reached an all time high in Feb. of 2008 when we passed the 600 mark! As 2008 rolls around we are doing the necessary repairs on the Milwaukee Road Depot at the Village and giving it a new coat of paint.. Continued on page 5....



The Sinnen House and Stony Hill School both needed new roofs. This was taken care of in spring of 2009. The Ozaukee County Fair celebrated their 150th anniversary in July of 2009 and we participated by having a 1928 farm truck and a 1967 red convertible to ride in, while some Girl Scouts handed out brochures. We began in earnest to check out a new Scan Pro Micro Film Reader/Printer and a new copy machine, both utterly necessary to keep up with our demands. We wanted to do something special working on a new publication. A book about Pioneer Village, written and illustrated by Mr. Don Henning. Ruth Renz assisted by supplying information about the buildings we have at the Village. This can be a useful tool for the students visiting on tour.

This brings us to a conclusion of the first 50 years of our Society. So much has been accomplished! So many dedicated workers, board members, society members and society friends have helped us to grow and flourish. There aren't enough words to thank those involved throughout the years. My hope is that this same spirit will continue and that our society will be a useful tool for many people in the years to come. May we continue to collect and be good caretakers of donations that are given to our society for preservation. Even the duplicated items become more valuable as time goes on.

To all loyal and faithful workers words cannot express our great appreciation for all you have done. It was worth it. Thank you!

Interurban Rail Depot Artifacts and Memories from the Scherf Family

The Ozaukee County Historical Society is proud to house its archives, museum and offices in the former Milwaukeee Electric Railway and Light Company Depot in Cedarburg. The depot building has been named the Hazel Wirth Archives Research Center. A special feature of the Center's museum is the Scherf collection of rail memorabilia.

Arnold Scherf was a motorman on the line from 1923 to its last run in March of 1948. He was a hard working man who loved his job and when he retired he saved the artifacts that had been an important part of his career.

His significant collection has been carefully catalogued and preserved by his daughter Vivian Laabs. Throughout the past several years, Vivian used the collection as she gave presentations to area school children. We are grateful that she has loaned this collection to the Society so that it can continue to educate those who have a curiosity about our county's history.

In addition to the artifacts Vivian very generously shares her colorful memories of the rail line intertwined with her family history. She is a frequent visitor to the depot and when she visits she brings guests along for a very special tour. On her most recent visit, she brought along her twin brother Stewart, sister-in-law Louise and nephew, Stewart, Jr.

Come in for a tour of our collection and you may just find Vivian and hear her memories first hand. The center is open each Tuesday from 9:00 until 3:00 as well as the second and fourth Monday from 5:00 until 8:00 and the second Saturday from 9:00 until 11:00. We are also open by appointment by contacting our Archivist, Ruth Renz at 252-242-0389.
